We invite you to read the notes of thanks and reflections in this newsletter. Thank you once again for your support and cooperation.



I want to express my deep appreciation to you for your patience and understanding.



I am proud that you never once complained that our short holiday trip had turned unknowingly into a frustrated Covid -19 lockdown situation in India.






